As the authors show, such themes blurred notions regarding propaganda and entertainment, terms that were often interchangeable and mutually reinforcing during the Cold War. The Cinema of the Soviet Thaw Lida Oukaderova. 2017-05-15 Following Joseph Stalin's death in 1953, the Soviet Union experienced a dramatic resurgence in cinematic production. The period of the Soviet Thaw became known for its relative political and cultural liberalization; its films, formally innovative and socially engaged, were swept to the center of international cinematic discourse. Looking closely at the process through which Russians continue to reexamine their past, Lewis argues that the cultural memory of spaceflight remains especially potent among other collective Soviet memories. It draws on a wide range of previously untapped archives, including those of the publisher Politizdat, of Soviet institutions in charge of propaganda, publishing, and literature, and of many individual writers. It also uses in-depth interviews with Brezhnev-era writers, editors, and publishers, and assesses the generic and stylistic innovations within the series' biographies and novels.

The Russian Cinema Reader Rimgaila Salys.2023-09-12 This two-volume reader is intended to accompany undergraduate courses in the history of Russian cinema and Russian culture through film.
