**Surviving the Bosnian Genocide** Selma Leydesdorff.2011 In July 1995, the Army of the Serbian Republic killed some 8,000 Bosnian men and boys in and around the town of Srebrenica--the largest mass murder in Europe since World War II. *Surviving the Bosnian Genocide* is based on the testimonies of 60 female survivors of the massacre who were interviewed by Dutch historian Selma Leydesdorff. The women, many of whom still live in refugee camps, talk about their lives before the Bosnian war, the events of the massacre, and the ways they have tried to cope with their fate. Though fragmented by trauma, the women tell of life and survival under extreme conditions, while recalling a time before the war when Muslims, Croats, and Serbs lived together peaceably. By giving them a voice, this book looks beyond the rapes, murders, and atrocities of that dark time to show the agency of these women during and after the war and their fight to uncover the truth of what happened at Srebrenica and why.

Stage Fright Martin Puchner.2003-04-01 Grounded equally in

discussions of theater history, literary genre, and theory, Martin Puchner's *Stage Fright: Modernism, Anti-Theatricality, and Drama* explores the conflict between avant-garde theater and modernism. While the avant-garde celebrated all things theatrical, a dominant strain of modernism tended to define itself against the theater, valuing lyric poetry and the novel instead. Defenders of the theater dismiss modernism's aversion to the stage and its mimicking actors as one more form of the old anti-theatrical prejudice. But Puchner shows that modernism's ambivalence about the theater was shared even by playwrights and directors and thus was a productive force responsible for some of the greatest achievements in dramatic literature and theater. A reaction to the aggressive theatricality of Wagner and his followers, the modernist backlash against the theater led to the peculiar genre of the closet drama—a theatrical piece intended to be read rather than staged—whose long-overlooked significance Puchner traces from the theatrical texts of Mallarmé and Stein to the dramatic Circe chapter of Joyce's *Ulysses*. At times, then, the anti-theatrical impulse leads to a withdrawal from the theater. At other times, however, it returns to the stage, when Yeats blends lyric poetry with Japanese Nôh dancers, when Brecht controls the stage with novelistic techniques, and when Beckett buries his actors in barrels and behind obsessive stage directions. The modernist theater thus owes much to the closet drama whose literary strategies it blends with a new *mise en scène*. While offering an alternative history of modernist theater and literature, Puchner also provides a new account of the contradictory forces within modernism.

**Denial: The Final Stage of Genocide?** John Cox, Amal Khoury, Sarah Minslow. 2021-09-21 Genocide denial not only abuses history and insults the victims but paves the way for future atrocities. Yet few, if any, books have offered a comparative overview and analysis of this problem. *Denial: The Final Stage of Genocide?* is a resource for understanding and

From a theoretical vantage point these essays break with the tradition of thinking of intermediality in analogy with intertextuality and attempt a phenomenological (re)definition of intermedial relations. Moreover, some of the analyses target films that expose the coexistence of the hypermediated experience of intermediality and the illusion of reality, connecting the questions of intermediality both to the indexical nature of cinematic representation and to the specific ideological and cultural context of the films, thus offering insights into a few questions regarding the "politics" of intermediality as well.

**Writing and Filming the Painting** Laura M. Sager Eidt. 2008 This innovative interdisciplinary study compares the uses of painting in literary texts and films. Incapacity Spencer Golub.2014-08-08 Spencer Golub builds on a recent trend in theater and performance studies in which scholars bring philosophy to bear on our understanding of performance. In Golub's case, however, he also adds to the mix a meditation on the nature of Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder, from which he has long suffered. Golub sees Wittgenstein's work as having both descriptive power in relation to OCD and, as such, offering some relief from this condition. Golub analyzes a broad range of dramatists, novelists, and filmmakers, among them Richard Foreman, Mac Wellman, Peter Handke, David Mamet, and Alfred Hitchcock. In their work, Golub finds an overriding interest in the relationship between the linguistic and the visual. Like Wittgenstein, the work of these artists is concerned with the limits of language's representational capacity. For Golub, it is these limits that give Wittgenstein's thought its therapeutic quality with respect to OCD. And it is Wittgenstein's notion of pain behavior that for Golub illuminates performance behavior - that which gives public expression to private experience. In this highly unconventional book, Golub charts new directions for exploring the relationship between theater and philosophy, and even for scholarly criticism itself.

Art at the Limits of Perception Jerome Carroll.2006 This book traces the significance that the modulations of sensory perception have had for thinking about aesthetics and art in the last two and a half centuries. Beyond a discussion of the philosophical significance of beauty, or of the puzzle of aesthetic representation, aesthetics is conceived broadly as a means of

describing our relationship to the world in terms of the habits of perception, and indeed the overturning of these habits, as in the modernist aesthetic of defamiliarisation. In the light of the ideas of the contemporary German aesthetic theorist, Wolfgang Iser, this book offers the first discussion of the theory and practice of art that operates at the poles of perception: sensory experience that exceeds conceptual organisation, and the imperceptible, or what Iser calls the 'anaesthetic'. These seemingly opposite poles have many parallels: a comparable indeterminacy of meaning and a similar challenge to representation, but also a shared focus on the habits and modulations of sensory perception and a similar interrogation of the boundary between art and that which surrounds it. The author applies the categories discussed to art practice, in particular to the theatre of Peter Handke, Samuel Beckett and Heiner Müller.

Voyage to the Sonorous Land, Or, The Art of Asking ; And, The Hour We Knew Nothing of Each Other Peter Handke.1996 This book presents two plays, both of which are translated into English for the first time. In *Voyage to the Sonorous Land, or The Art of Asking*, a cockeyed optimist and a spoilsport lead a group of characters to the hinterland of their imaginations, where they search not for the right answers but for the questions. *The Hour We Knew Nothing of Each Other* takes place in a city square where more than four hundred characters pass by one another without speaking a single word.

Kaspar and Other Plays Peter Handke.1989 Nobel Prize winner Peter Handke's first full-length drama, hailed in Europe as the play of the decade and compared in importance to *Waiting for Godot* *Kaspar* is the story of an autistic adolescent who finds himself at a complete existential loss on the stage, with but a single sentence to call his own. Drilled by prompters who use terrifyingly funny logical and alogical language-sequences, *Kaspar* learns to speak normally and eventually becomes creative-doing his own thing with words; for this he is destroyed. In

Offending the Audience and Self-Accusation, one-character speaks, Handke further explores the relationship between public performance and personal identity, forcing us to reconsider our sense of who we are and what we know.

**Fassbinder's Germany** Thomas Elsaesser.1996 Rainer Werner Fassbinder is one of the most prominent and important authors of post-war European cinema. Thomas Elsaesser is the first to write a thoroughly analytical study of his work. **Exhausting Dance** Andre Lepecki.2006-07-13 The only scholarly book in English dedicated to recent European contemporary dance, *Exhausting Dance: Performance and the Politics of Movement* examines the work of key contemporary choreographers who have transformed the dance scene since the early 1990s in Europe and the US. *The American War* Harrell Fletcher.2006 In June, 2005, while traveling in Vietnam, artist Harrell Fletcher visited The War Remnants Museum in Ho Chi Minh City. Deeply affected by the exhibit, Fletcher returned to photograph all of the images and text descriptions from the main museum with the intention of representing the exhibition in the United States. Fletcher's exhibition *The American War* toured for two years, stopping at various U. S. venues including the Center for Advanced Visual Studies at M. I. T. and White Columns in New York City. With this collection of images, Fletcher encourages his audience to reconsider opinions of the War in Vietnam and other American wars that have occurred since. Harrell Fletcher is a visual artist working in mixed media: video, installation, photography and web based works. His work was featured in the 2004 Whitney Biennial. Fletcher has an MFA from the California College of Arts and Crafts and has taught and lectured in the US and Europe. In Spring 2004, he taught at New York's Cooper Union. A hallmark of his work is to devise strategies for transforming the everyday experiences and objects of community residents into curated exhibitions.

Drawing on work in areas as diverse as scenographic theory, medical phenomenology, contemporary linguistics, and feminist theories of the body, Garner addresses topics such as

theatrical image, stage objects, dramatic language, the suffering body, and the staging of gender, all with a view toward developing a phenomenology of mise en scene.
